MONSIGNOR'S MUSINGS

More Masses and Confessions

Thanks be to God it's becoming more evident all the time that our numbers are growing at the Sunday Eucharist. Thus, it's become necessary to reinstate our Saturday Vigil Mass of Anticipation. After consultation with the Parish Pastoral Council on September 15th, it was decided to begin our Saturday Vigil Mass on the first Saturday of October, the 3rd. After looking at the schedule of Masses for the City, it was unanimously suggested that Mass be at 4:30 p.m., which suggestion I happily received. 4:00 p.m. can be early, 5:00 p.m. can be late and so this was a good middle of the road approach. I know that a response to this will be about the fact that it gets dark early in the winter. When you look at dusk/evening and all of that, my guess is that it could be a difficulty for about three months of the year or so. The point is, we all need to make compromises for the greater good. I want us to view ourselves as a parish family which needs to have a little give and take (if not a lot!). Confessions will be heard on Saturday from 3:45 to 4:15 p.m. in the Sacristy. Mass set up will occur for the most part in advance by me.

Also, we will go back to our old daily Mass schedule beginning Monday, October 5th: two Masses each day with one at 6:30 a.m. and the other at 12:10 p.m. with confessions heard daily Monday through Friday from 11:30 to 11:55 a.m. Mass will remain at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday. Weekday Mass set up for the 12:10 will need to occur before confessions begin.

I pray this communicates a sense of vitality in our parish and that "we're coming back!". More sacraments means we need more people to help out. Please pray about what you can do to contribute. For those of you who have been doing this a long time, please think about others you can tap on the shoulder to invite them to be a more intimate part of the inner workings of our family. Or, suggest names to me and I will happily do so. Thank you all for your patience as life continues to unfold and evolve. We have much of we can and could be proud. Let's all together breathe new life and energy into our Parish and the Mother Church of the Diocese!

In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the wedding. Weddings are not ordinarily celebrated during Lent.

We celebrate the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary on September 8th and the Holy Name of Mary on September 12th. Assured that no other person can understand our sufferings better than Our Lady of Sorrows, we commemorate this title of Mary on September 15th, one day after the feast of the Exaltation of the Cross.

HOSPITAL VISITS & VISITATION OF THE SICK:

To secure a priest for unplanned or emergency admissions to a local hospital, it is vitally important that the patient, if possible, or a family member and/or friends contact the hospital pastoral care department to have an on call priest administer the sacraments. The on call priest is considered part of the pastoral team and does not count toward the "one visitor per day" rule (Gunderson).

If you become homebound because of illness or due to a post hospital stay and would like to be visited; or those who are seriously ill or have been sick for a long period of time should receive the Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion. Those with imminent preplanned hospital procedures should call the parish office to make arrangements for anointing. To the greatest extent possible one should be anointed apart from a hospital stay since there are such severe visiting restrictions

WHEN IT'S GOOD TO "LIE" TO YOUR CHILDREN

"Don't Believe in God? Lie to Your Children." This was the title of a December 6th article which appeared in the Wall Street Journal by Erica Komisar, who is a Jewish psychoanalyst and therapist. She is the author of the book "Being There: Why Prioritizing Motherhood in the First Three Years Matters." The title is already saying something important. At any rate, the title of the Wall Street Journal article was quite provocative. It was a good article with a positive shout out supporting organized religion within the family. She says that as a therapist she is asked to explain why depression and anxiety are so common among children and adolescents. She said that one of the most important and neglected reasons is the declining interest in religion. This cultural shift has proven disastrous for millions of young people. Over the past 20 years there has been a 20% decrease in attendance at formal religious services. Nearly one half of adults under the age of 30 do not identify with any organized religion. The idea of nihilism or nothingness regarding God and religion is a fertilizer for anxiety and depression, Komisar says.

Parents often ask her: How do I talk to my child about death if I do not believe in God or heaven? Ms. Komisar states her answer is always the same: Lie. The idea that we simply die and turn into dust may work for some adults (and even then I'd question that) but it certainly doesn't help children. Belief in the heaven and in a providential God helps them to grapple with the tremendous and incomprehensible loss called death. In an age of broken families, distracted parents, school violence and dire climate predictions, religion, Komisar says, plays a big role in children's ability to cope with these realities. They have a real sense that there is a plan, there is something more, that ultimately life does make sense. It communicates that I am cared for and all will be well!

The article also said that a 2018 study indicated that being raised in a family with spiritual and religious beliefs positively affects the mental health of children. Children and teens attending weekly religious services scored higher on psychological and well-being measurements and have a lower risk of mental illness. Weekly attendance is associated with higher rates of volunteerism, a sense of mission, forgiveness, lower probabilities of drug use and early sexual initiation. She goes on to say that parents frequently ask: How can I instill gratitude and empathy in my children. These virtues are embraced by most religions. She said that in her Jewish faith they have the concept of "healing the world". And therefore she said we expect our children to volunteer in the community, the synagogue, and the family. Of course all of this is true for Christianity as well. Gratitude is an antidote to entitlement. Empathy or love helps us to see Christ in others, to reach out to those who need nurturing or our care. These are strong building blocks for forming great character. They are protectors against depression and anxiety. Komisar states that in an individualistic, narcissistic and lonely society religion provides children the rare opportunity for natural community. The idea that hundreds if not thousands of people can gather and pray together and to sing God's praises is a great collective buffer against a fractured, empty, divided, bullying culture which emphasizes perfectionism, selfishness and materialism. Interestingly enough many confirmation students during their interview with me say that is the one thing they like most about the Catholic Church—it is this sense of community. Why, then, they for the

most part they do not continue to practice the faith actively after they are confirmed is beyond me. It is an odd dichotomy.

Komisar says that religion practiced within the family is necessary and needed in a world where teens have hundreds of virtual friends but very few real ones where they can actually sit down and talk face-to-face. It seems to me the art of communication (and communion) is greatly being weakened. [Please note that most of what is stated above is directly attributable to Ms. Komisar excepting the personal parish things I mention.]

I encourage families to be intentional in the practice of their faith as much as possible in real, meaningful and concrete ways. The rigid "let's go to church or if we don't we will go to hell" approach does not work, nor is it spiritually enticing or fruitful. Rather, we ought to emphasize the joy of being together and that we are part of something greater than ourselves. In a parish family community we experience together that we love God and together we are loved by Him. I strongly encourage families to participate in the life of our Parish family and other community opportunities. As pastor over these past ten years I have observed that families who participate and volunteer within the parish there is a real sense that the church is their home and they feel at home. There is ownership. The church isn't just some pesky thing to get off my back once a week. I ask you to do two things. Number one. Talk about this within your own family. How do we participate in our faith community? What more could we do? Are we doing well in that area? What might the Lord be asking us to do? And number two. Have that conversation with other families, perhaps within your own extended families, or, with those with whom you work and socialize. You are able to go into places that I am not able to go. This is an important way to exercise the gift of faith. The family is the domestic church and so if there is any place where the fullness of religion ought to be practiced it is there within the family!

Have you ever noticed that in the Creed we state belief in the most supremely important realities of our faith? We state belief in God the Father, creator of all, his Son Jesus, who died, was buried and resurrected and ascended into heaven, to return and judge the world. We profess belief in the Holy Spirit, the Resurrection of the body and eternal life after death, etc. And in the midst of all of these things we also state that we believe in the Church. What!?! Doesn't that seem really odd to you??? That seems so out of place. To believe in the Church along with these higher realities does not seem to make a lot of sense if the Church is a mere institution or grouping of people with a set of rules. But belief in the Church is right up there with all of these other high spiritual realities because the Church is not an organization, it is an organism. It is a living, breathing reality with a heart and a soul. So, to profess belief in the Church (the Body of Christ on Earth) means to profess belief in the "domestic church" otherwise known as the family, which is a part or a cell within the bigger Body of Christ. It's all one unified whole. The goal of the family is to grow in holiness as a family connected to its greater family the Church first experienced in the Parish. Therefore to disconnect from the Church/Parish (especially active Sunday worship on the Lord's Day) is to disconnect from oneself. It is spiritual self-amputation. Perhaps a goal for our Cathedral family is to grow in the practice of the faith connected to Parish life. The family at Nazareth was and is holy precisely because it was completely centered on Jesus. May we all go and do the same: to live Christ-centered lives living our faith and religion with great joy and purpose!
